**FORMER LORRY DRIVER MASTERS ARCHAEOLOGY**

Robert Galloway, aged 54, from Kidderminster, is a former lorry driver who has completed a BA (Hons) and an MA in archaeology. Robert's remarkable achievement will be awarded with a Regional Learning Works Award - sponsored by the Learning and Skills Council - from the National Institute of Adult Continuing Education (NIACE), as part of Adult Learners' Week 17<sup>th</sup> – 23<sup>rd</sup> May 2008.

Robert, 54, started college in 1999 after a bad illness, found that he enjoyed studying, and was prompted to go on an Access to HE course. "Learning is very exciting," he says. His tutor at Birmingham university, Roger White, says that his cheerfulness and passion for his subject infected his fellow students on his MA course. "I enjoy the academic challenge with people who want to learn like myself. I wish that people could understand that learning is a great thing," Robert adds.

The turning point was the diagnosis of visual dyslexia. "Now that I knew that all the problems I have had in my life were not my fault I could make up for 30 years or so I had wasted," he says. Finding out that he was dyslexic was a weight of his mind, and in a way it spurred him on to achieve more. Learning to cope with it was another challenge he relished. "I had a chance [at learning] and I grabbed it with both hands. And I still want more." Robert has decided to continue his learning with a postgraduate research degree.

David Lammy, Minister for Skills, said, "I never fail to be inspired by the stories I hear about learner's achievements. Robert's hard work confirms my belief that improving your skills can be a life changing experience."

He continued, "The benefits better skills bring to learners and those around them are wide-ranging. On the personal level people become more confident and have higher

self-esteem, and individuals can develop better job prospects. More widely this can lead to parents being better able to help their children with homework and learner's employers becoming more competitive. Rachel Thomson, Senior Campaigns Officer at NIACE, said, "In spite of the fact this is the 17th annual Adult Learners' Week we continue to be amazed by the quality of the nominations we have received. Robert's story is an indication of how learning can transform lives completely. All of this year's winners have shown a huge commitment, passion and creativity throughout their learning journeys. Their achievements are all the more inspiring due to the challenges they have overcome and they fully deserve to be recognised as outstanding and inspirational adult learners."

James Plaskitt, Parliamentary Under-Secretary at the Department for Work and Pensions, and Minister responsible for ESF, said, "I am pleased that the ESF is again sponsoring Adult Learners' Week which provides a wonderful opportunity to celebrate learning and communicate how it can help people improve their job prospects.
